

Take a step back in time with videographer Richard Noe's visits to the Locke Farm



The May Northampton Township Historical Society meeting will feature Professional Photographer and Historical film maker Richard Noe. Richard will introduce historical society member, Paul Locke, who owns one of the few remaining farms in Northampton Township.

Richard will then show his new DVD documentary "A Step Back in Time" completed last winter at the Locke farm. This amazing first half of the film shows the doors opened for the first time in many years, and a tour of the deep circa 1850's cold cellar and hand built stone walled well.

The second part of the film is a tour of Paul's "Sweitzer" (Swiss) style barn not used for the past 25 years. Jeff Marshall narrates the types and names of hand hewn beams and explores how barns were made before the 1900s.

After a short intermission, to celebrate our upcoming Memorial day, a repeat showing of Richard's recreated film, "Parades & Events, 1920-40s Richboro, Pa. using 16MM footage taken by Alva Gill and the Tyler Estate.

This film was introduced several years ago at one of our meetings and a copy is in the Northampton Library. The film still is spellbinding with sound and narration added to the silent B&W, early 1900's footage, by the legendary Gill's work which was not combined until the digital age for a completed film.

To see a parade in Richboro, on packed dirt Second Street Pike, and an entire community march is still a site to behold. The film also includes a May Day event at the Richboro School, circa 1940s. Richard Noe spent several years working to create this film with help from Betty Luff, who was in several parades as a child during this "parade era".

The meeting starts at 7 PM on Wednesday, May 20, at the Northampton Township Library, Lower Holland and Township Road, Richboro. The public is welcome and please bring a friend.





NEWS FROM THE PRESIDENT

At our May meeting we welcome society member and videographer, Richard Noe, who will show his video productions of the Paul Locke farm in Holland as well as a repeat performance of the famous Memorial Day parades of the 1920's-40's originally shot in 16MM film by Alva Gill. Richard has and is doing a great job in preserving our past in photographs and video so please come out and support him in his efforts.

Richboro will be going through a new phase of development in the coming months and years with a very large part of the center of town facing redevelopment. Both the Giamo (Giuseppe) and former Davis properties totaling over 16 acres will be developed. While the proposal for the Davis tract includes saving the historic house at the far northeast edge of the property we still need to be ever vigilant about the historic look and character of our town. When the Spread Eagle Inn was moved and restored it was decried that any future structure built as part of that or other nearby developments in Richboro would follow its Victorian façade design. I urge you to keep informed about what is happening in our town and speak up if you think it goes against our historic heritage. We have already lost a great deal of what was Richboro and that makes it even more important to save the few historic structures and sites that remain. Perhaps we could convince the retailers at this site to feature pictures in their establishments of buildings, like the Black Bear, that were previously located there and maybe the developer would entertain markers, close to Second Street Pike, where the buildings once stood.

This being our last meeting for the first half of the year I wish you a great summer and look forward to seeing you again, next at Northampton Days in September, and at our Fall meetings.

Richboro's Other Hotel

Today it seems hard to believe that in the 1700's and early 1800's Richboro was described as two separate towns. Where the crossroads of Almshouse Road met Second Street Pike was called Addisville and in the lower end of town where Bustleton Pike and Second Street Pike met was called Leedomville.

The first tavern license in town was granted in 1745 and around 1800 it was known as the "Sign of the Bear" later becoming known as "The Black Bear."

According to Davis' History of Bucks County, Richard Leedom and his family owned the Black Bear Hotel from 1762-1858. It was originally a log cabin, replaced by a stone building and in 1882 a French roof was added.

During the Revolution, early meetings of the Bucks County Committee of Observation and Inspection took place in Leedom's tavern. This is where the Democrats held their political meetings, while the Republicans met at the White Bear (later the Spread Eagle).

Since no photos exist from that period, many of our earliest images of the black and white bear hotels are from the Arnold Brothers postcards; the brothers photographed and printed about 200 scenes from all parts of Bucks County.

It is written that Leedom lived on the second floor of the tavern until he built the stone mansion across Second Street Pike sometime around 1779. He purchased the property in 1776. The prominent innkeeper also operated a grocery store in this house which later became the Milton Luff farm and

today is the Campbell-Thomas Funeral Home. Jean Luff, who was born in this house, recalls when the original barn burnt, the original date stone (1779) was found in the ruins.

Richard Leedom joined the Fourth Association Company of Northampton Township, and his name appeared on the rolls dated August 19, 1775 as a private under Captain Henry Lott. Richard Leedom spent most of his life in Northampton Township. The Black Bear Tavern continued as a tavern until 1926 when the late Jack Frey purchased the property. It was used as his private home until it was torn down and replaced with a ranch style house in 1960. For many years after he purchased it in 1926 travelers would continue to stop expecting a meal at the tavern.

Jean Luff graduated from high school with Jack Frey in 1938 and for several years worked at Frey's Machine Shop which was located adjacent to the property. He employed 3 or 4 full time men at the facility.

Many will remember Jack Frey as the first Northampton Township police chief. He would get irritated when drivers ignored the stop sign at the Second Street and Bustleton Pike intersection and sped through town, so he took it upon himself to purchase a uniform and installed a light and siren atop his Lincoln Continental. I can remember seeing him chasing "city drivers" towards Chain Bridge during the summer months.

In 1830 Addisville and Leedomville became known as Richborough, later shortened to Richboro after the then Postmaster Richard (Rich) Thomas.

ELECTRIC FOUNTAIN DISPLAY INSTALLED BY "JACK" FREY

One of the Few Fountains of Its Kind in Penna. Now to Be in Richboro

Richboro has the honor of possessing one of the few electrical fountain displays in the state of Pennsylvania. This fountain is erected in the front of "Jack" Frey's garage and is beautified by 35 colored lights.

Mr. Frey, a progressive business man, is continually laying new schemes and he himself has made the landscape surrounding his residence very attractive.

Besides being an expert mechanic, "Jack" is 2 regular Paderewski, when it comes to fiddling. A. S.






