Learn how to analyze and care for them and receive a professional evaluation of your antique

The Northampton Township Historical Society's annual dinner meeting will feature a talk on Antiques by Lewis Larason. His talk will include topics on avoiding fakes, buying and caring for antique furniture and preparing antiques for the next generation.

Mr. Larason is the owner of Larason Antiques in Chalfont, and he has a long history of teaching, writing, restoring and consulting in the antiques field. He presently writes columns and features about antique furniture for the *New York/Pennsylvania Collector*, for the *North Penn Reporter*, Lansdale, the Workshop department of the *Bucks and Chester County Town and Country Living* magazines and the Antiques department for the *Delaware Valley Home Showcase*. He teaches adult evening classes at the Central Bucks West and North Penn high schools.

Attendees are encouraged to bring antique items for Mr. Larason to evaluate. He will determine if it is a real antique and tell you something about it. Come have dinner with us and enjoy a nice evening with your Historical Society friends. Visitors are always welcome. Please bring a friend.

One of my very favorite teachers was a maiden lady who drove down from Doylestown each day. (This was rare because most of our woman teachers in the 1930's were still boarding with local families.) To this day I believe Miss Ada Thut, is partly responsible for the six girls in our 1942 graduating class having stayed so close. There were seven girls in our class until Regina Hllowell left us to enter George School in our sophomore year.

Low Dutch Reformed Church Graveyard Richboro (Bucks County), Pennsylvania

Henry Wynkoop (1737-1816) Born in Northampton Township, Bucks County, Pa., March 2, 1737. Delegate to Continental Congress from Pennsylvania, 1779-1782; state court judge, 1783-1789; U.S. Representative from Pennsylvania at-large, 1789-1791. Died in Bucks County, Pa., March 25, 1816. Interment at Low Dutch Reformed Church Graveyard.

Davisville Baptist Church Cemetery Davisville (Bucks County), Pennsylvania

John Davis (1788-1878) Born in Pennsylvania. U.S. Representative from Pennsylvania 6th District, 1839-1841. Interment at Davisville Baptist Church Cemetery.

Neshaminy Cemetery Warwick (Bucks County), Pennsylvania

Robert Ramsey (1780-1849) Born in Pennsylvania. Member of Pennsylvania state legislature; U.S. Representative from Pennsylvania 6th District, 1833-1835, 1841-1843. Interment at Neshaminy Cemetery.

She was so patient with all of us through this project and many others including cooking, quilting and all aspects of homemaking.

Richoro School had a beautiful large home economics room. Large enough to set up tables for one of our projects which was to cook and serve a roast beef dinner for 20-25 future farmers and their fathers.

One whole weekend, Miss Thut accompanied a group of girls from different grades. We spend the time in a cabin at Chain Bridge where we roughed it to gain experience at housekeeping without the conveniences of the day. We even took along my sister's dog for protection. When we weren't preparing meals, cleaning up, eating, and making beds, we took long walks, one being to the covered bridge at Worthington Mill.

Because of the war the usual destination of the seniors for their class trip, Washington D.C., had to be changed to New York City and of course we choose Miss Thut for our chaperone.

These are just a few of the fondest memories I have of Miss Thut. She has passed away but the six girls (women) are still close and get together often. We reminisce about her and wonder if se ever realized what an influence she had on our lives.
