In the Shadow of Independence Hall: Archaeological Discoveries from the National Constitution Center Site, Independence National Historic Park, Philadelphia

The September meeting of the Northampton Township Historical Society will feature a talk by Douglas B. Mooney about the discoveries from excavations at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia. Recent excavations have uncovered the best-preserved archaeological site ever found in the City of Philadelphia. Encompassing more than 115 historical house lots, these excavations have produced more than 1 million artifacts associated with the Colonial, Revolutionary War-era, and Nineteenth century inhabitants of the City. Additional finds include an intact prehistoric Native American campsite, objects used by eighteenth century free African American residents, as well as the remains of some 150 individuals from the Second Presbyterian Church Cemetery. This presentation will provide an overview of the archaeological investigations at this important site and discuss many of the most significant finds, including a number of items that represent "one-of-a-kind" discoveries never before found in the city.

Douglas Mooney is a Senior Archaeologist with the Archaeological and Historic Architecture Group of the URS Corporation (URS) located in Burlington, NJ, and was responsible for directing fieldwork at the National Constitution Center Site. Mr. Mooney has twenty years experience in archaeology and cultural resources management. He earned his Master's Degree in Anthropology from Pennsylvania State University and holds a Batchelor's Degree in Anthropology from West Virginia University. Mr. Mooney has participated in the excavation of more than 150 sites throughout Pennsylvania and the surrounding States, and is the author of more than 60 technical archaeological reports and professional presentations. His experience encompasses prehistoric, historical, urban, and mortuary archaeology.



The National Constitution Center is a history museum on Independence Mall in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, just two blocks from the Liberty Bell and Independence Hall. The museum teaches visitors the history and relevance of the United States Constitution through theatre, interactive exhibits, and hundreds of historic artifacts. The museum opened on July 4, 2004, and was designed by American architect Henry N. Cobb and museum design firm Ralph Appelbaum Associates. The National Constitution Center is located within Independence National Historical Park.

The mission of the Constitution Center, as established in the Constitution Heritage Act of 1988, is to disseminate information about the United States Constitution on a non-partisan basis in order to increase the awareness and understanding of the Constitution among the American people. The main exhibit hall is circular and presents three concentric rings of exhibts: the outermost a chronology of Constitutional history featuring artifacts and original documents, the second ring of interactive exhibits based on the preamble to the Constitution, and the inner ring featuring "talk backs" and ways to participate in the Constitutional dialogue.

It is with reluctance that once again I have to bid goodbye to summer.


We enjoyed the planting of flowers, having loads of company, the birth of an eighth granddaughter and a 35th wedding anniversary celebration.


Northampton Township's One Room Schools

As early as 1819, there were one room school houses in Northampton Township with first through eight grades in one room with one teacher. By 1871, there were eight of these schools scattered throughout the township.

Since the one in the town of Richboro was the most centrally located and a second floor was added and in 1896, a two year high school was started. This high school was located on what later became the Davis Pontiac property. First through sixth grades were on the first floor with Miss Sally Twining as the teacher and seventh through tenth grades were upstairs with Thomas Bock as the high school teacher and principal. This meant that if students wanted to continue their education beyond the eight grade they had to walk from all parts of the township.

Those living in the Churchville area attended the **Fairview** one room school on Bustleton Pike, today a private residence at 279 Bustleton Pike.



The Rocksville one room school, Holland Road

Those living in the Holland area walked to the **Rocksville** one room school Holland road just up the road from Finney's store.

There was an **East Holland** one room school at Buck and East Holland Road. This school was erected about 1819, possibly of wood but was later replaced with a stone building in 1858.

Forest Grove one room school was built in 1838, on Hatboro Road. It served the residents living in the "bulltown" areas of the township.

The **Jacksonville** one room school, on Jacksonville road near Almshouse Road, was probably built after the school board acquired the property in 1857. It replaced and earlier building. Note the bell tower on the roof.



East Holland School, Buck and East Holland Road

The **Groveland** one room school still stands on Richboro-Newtown Road where it intersects with Holland Road.



Forest Grove School, Hatboro Road

The **Pleasant Plains** one room school was on New Road near Hatboro Road.

All of these one room schools closed in 1913, when the then new and modern large stone school was built in Richboro (now moved to the back of the Commerce Bank property) and they are all now private residences.

The Jacksonville School, near Jacksonville and Almshouse Road.


In doing family research, I was fortunate to find a photo of the 1898 class at Forest Grove School on Hatboro Road. A young Jesse Rubicam was responsible for teaching 25-30 children each day from 1st to 8th grades. He also had the responsibility of keeping the fire going in winter, acting as nurse when a child was hurt or became ill and the cleaning of the school.

Five of my husbands aunts and uncles are present in this picture. They are the children of James M. and Mary Slack Luff who had seven children. My father-in-law, Charles F. Luff was born in 1885 and had either quit school or was needed at home since he is not in the photo. A seventh child, Leonard, had not yet been born.
